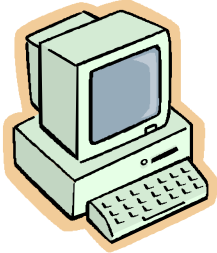

The members of the Digital SIG began the evening with a discussion on backing up important files. Everyone did 'saves' with most members present responding that they regularly saved important files. They saved their data to a variety of media including CDs, DVDs, Flash drives, external hard drives and a second internal hard drive. All agreed it was an important step in good computer 'health'.

Lyn Morse had just come back from an extensive trip and had taken lots of digital photos. She had done some research and learned that all DVD are not the same. Some are of higher quality (and price) than others. Lyn was interested in preserving her precious photos, so she selected Verbatim DVDs, which are 40 times more scratch resistant and considered of archival quality.

Lyn also shared information on two especially useful new products. One is a Kensington PocketHub Media Center that has memory card slots that can read 15 different card formats and plugs into the USB port. The other product was a PowerSquid that allows you to plug in five AC-adaptor bricks at a time.

Dick Burg said he had a problem with losing his "Favorites" list when he lost the AOL program. When he re-installed AOL in his computer, the Favorites button no longer showed the sites he had compiled. The question was how to save the Favorites file?

We practiced on the lab computer and found the path to be: Local C drive>Documents and Setting>(your name)>Favorites. Locate and save to a CD or other media.

Are you into using the Internet? If so, you will enjoy attending the monthly ISIG. It is a free wheeling discussion group on things "internet". We enjoy exploring the known and unknown.

Moderated by Terry Kay, Kent McDonald and/or Kerry Green, our gatherings may begin with some prepared material by the Moderator. That is followed by questions and answers from the floor. Bring your Internet related questions and hopefully you will get an answer. Certainly we all learn something at each session.

At the December meeting, Kent presented an overview of the current "Internet Telephone Options". None of us will be quick to abandon our existing wired, wireless and cell options. The new super-duper Verizon FIOS provides excellent voice quality, but the pricing is

the same as always for the phone service--no bundle discounts yet. For people who make international long distance calls, which are expensive using cell phones, the SKYPE VOIP alternative is attractive. If the call is made from your computer to another SKYPE subscriber, it is free no matter where you are calling. If you call a regular telephone there is a \$.023 per minute charge. Registering with SKYPE is free. One of our members is using the service and says the voice quality is excellent.

Kerry Green always has something useful to offer. He identified two sites for useful info:

a) Tech Support Forum at <http://www.techsupportforum.com/> is a free online tech support forum community where over 85,000 members from around the world come to discuss and get help with all issues related to computers in over 390,000 posted discussions!

b) Greatis, at <http://www.greatis.com/appdata/> is a software company offering a free listing of Necessary, Optional, Useless and Dangerous programs you may find in your Windows Startup.

Kerry said at the January meeting we will take a look at some very useful downloads from Microsoft, as well as explore how to use and interpret the information found in the App Database at greatis.com. This database will tell you what programs you can safely exclude from your startup folder and what they do.

Many of us went home with this info and did a little "house" cleaning.

We'll talk about what to do with files, how to customize folders, where to put files and folders – just really basic things. All will be simple ideas to get you started filing things away in your new file cabinet, uh, computer.

And then, of course, you'll learn how to find them once every thing is nicely filed away.

Basic Five +1

A New Class

Let's get right to the problem! You want to get your digital photos cleaned up, NOW! You want to learn how to do this, NOW! Basic Five is a four-hour class that's going to do just that for you. One day, four hours, and you have the basic tools for photo editing in Photoshop Elements.

First, you'll learn how to convert your original photo to psd format. In psd, you make all the changes and corrections you want without affecting the quality of the photo. In psd, you'll (2) crop, (3) clone, (4) enhance and (5) add text to the photo.

Those are the five basic things used in making a good photo a great one. That being said, there is the final step, the + 1, and that is putting the edited psd photo back into jpg format.

In Basic Five, you'll be working with 20 or 30 photos, all of which have a problem or two that needs to be corrected. One will be so dark you'd think it was a throwaway. We'll do the problem solving together, step-by-step, and then you'll do a few on your own.

There will be a Basic Five Workshop as a follow up for those who'd like to work on photos of their own with me available for help. In that class, bring 20 or 30 photos on your flash drive to work with. Have a

problem and we'll try to solve it right there.

The Workshop is also a four-hour class, so there should be ample time for you to get the work done and maybe even leave early.

Teaching Apple Works To Speak

Some of you might want to try AppleWork's Text-to-Speech application to have your text read aloud. You can use this technology to: Proofread your documents, help grandchildren who are new readers learn how to read and help visually impaired or tired, old eyes like ours. To see how it works, open AppleWorks and create a new Word Processing document. If your Button Bar isn't visible, go to the Window menu and click on Show Button Bar. **O p e n A p p l e - W o r k s > P r e f e r e n c e s > B u t t o n B a r .** Click on the triangle next to General to hide that group of buttons. Click on the triangle next to Word Processing to show those available buttons. Scroll down to Speak Text button and drag it to you Button Bar. Click on Done. Now type some text in your open Word Processing document. Select (highlight) the text you typed and click on the Speak Text Button.

Keeping Your PC Safe Online – The Next Level

By now, I'm sure you all know the importance of having up-to-date antivirus software to prevent viruses from infecting your PC, but there is more to keeping your PC safe online than antivirus protection. By the way, if you don't have antivirus software yet, you can download it without charge at <http://free.grisoft.com/doc/Get+AVG+FREE/lng/us/tp1/v5>. If you have AOL, you can download McAfee without charge. If you have Roadrunner, you can download EZArmor without charge.

Surge Protection

Protect your computer from being damaged by electrical surges by buying a surge suppressor. This is much more than the simple power strip that you probably have now. It is a device that absorbs power surges that can fry your computer's delicate electronic components and render it useless. Look for a surge suppressor that protects against at least 3,500 joules of surge. A good one can be purchased at Costco for only \$20. Do it today before the next blackout/surge fries your computer!!! If you have an older surge suppressor, you should know that over time, the surge suppression protection diminishes and an older device may no longer protect your computer. Buy a new one every few years.

Cable modem Router

If you have a broadband high-speed internet connection like Roadrunner, you are always online at the same address, which makes it easier for hackers to find your PC to upload spammer programs and other bad things to your computer without your approval. If they know they can find you again at the same address, they can use your PC as a spambot to help them send out their thousands of horrible spam emails. To prevent this, you should purchase a broadband router, which hides you online at the same address as everyone else who owns that same router. A Linksys Wireless-B router is currently available at Best Buy for only \$20. Even if you have only ONE PC, you should buy a router to help keep your PC safe online.

Anti-Spyware Software

Spyware can choke your computer so badly that it slows down to a crawl. It can also allow strangers to operate your computer remotely, sending out their hateful spam from YOUR computer without your knowledge or consent. Antispyware software can be installed on your PC without charge. Microsoft has a free version for Windows XP which can be downloaded at www.microsoft.com. Spybot Search and Destroy is also free and available at www.download.com.

Anti-Adware Software

Adware is another menace that chokes your PC and slows it down. It also sends you many annoying popup ads and emails. Ad-Aware is free and available to download at www.download.com.
