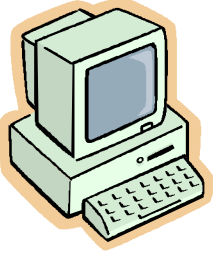

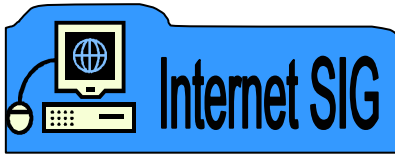
Report on Sale of old PCs

As a follow up to the presentation in March about using a firewall, we took a trip to

www.grc.com,

Steve Gibson's web site that tells us all about security on the web. Once there, we went to his 'Shields Up' section, and then scrolled down to the Shields Up Utility to probe our ports for open vulnerabilities.

The subject for the April meeting was suggested to me by Barbara Kaye, and it is a good one – thank you Barbara. We discovered Site Advisor, which you can easily find at

www.siteadvisor.com,

where you can check to see if a web site you are about to visit contains spyware, or has available downloads with spyware attached. This is really handy, and the search function is free. It gets better...you can download the free program to your computer. It places a small tool on your Internet Explorer toolbar that will tell you if you're on a safe or unsafe website. It also works with Mozilla Firefox. As a bonus (a big bonus), it identifies search results within major search engines such as Google, Yahoo, and MSN. This is really great! Download the program, and it will steer you away from potentially dangerous websites and downloads that contain spyware.

I have given this program a trial run and I really like it. Hopefully by now, we all realize

how important it is to avoid spyware, and that we should use programs such as Ad-Aware and SpyBot Search and Destroy to rid our computers of spyware. Unfortunately, a buildup of spyware will slow our computers to a crawl, much like a virus will do, so don't let it happen to you. Both of these free programs can be downloaded from

www.download.com.

Just click on the Security & Spyware link on the left side and then scroll down to the program of your choice to start the download.

The April Windows Special Interest Group (SIG) featured an interesting presentation by Barbara Kaye, who showed us how to easily set up a wireless Internet connection network. All you need is your existing broadband modem (cable or dsl), a Linksys wireless router, and a laptop or desktop computer capable of receiving a wireless signal. There are other brands of wireless routers, such as D-Link, Belkin, and Netgear, but we prefer Linksys because of their excellent product support.

Barbara demonstrated that great support by going to the Linksys support web page,

where she downloaded a small program that took us step by step through the set up process for the particular Linksys model wireless router she was using. It all took less than fifteen minutes for Barbara to put her laptop computer online and connecting to Web pages. Part of the setup process allowed her to password protect her wireless connection, so that other nearby computers cannot use her wireless signal without permission.

You can check this out by going to www.linksys.com - point to SUPPORT and then click on TECHNICAL SUPPORT. Once there, you will see Easy Connect, which will link you into the step-by-step set up process. Note that this is for Windows XP users only.

The obvious advantage to setting up a wireless router in your home is that you (or your guests) can access the Internet from any room using a laptop or desktop computer equipped with a wireless adapter (receiver). Wireless adapters come in several configurations that can connect to your computer using any USB port, the PCMCIA slot on your laptop, or an open PCI slot on the main board of your desktop computer. Linksys makes all of these types of wireless adapters.

Another strong consideration for using a wireless (or wired) router is that all computers connected to it are put behind a hardware firewall – the IP address of the computer is concealed – only the IP address of the router is 'visible' on the Internet. It is strongly recommended to also use a software firewall such as Norton Internet

Security, McAfee Personal Firewall, BlackICE PC Protection (a few of many retail products), or the free Zone Alarm firewall available for download at zonelabs.com.

The Windows SIG will meet again on Tuesday, May 16th at 7:00 pm in the Computer Club lab. If you ever have the need to password protect individual files on your computer, you just may learn how at our next meeting.

The Digital SIG group got a close-up look at Google's free picture cataloging program Picasa.

Barbara Kaye, who is the only person who is authorized to download and install programs to the PCs, showed us how to download the Picasa program.

We looked at how Picasa indexes the photos already in the computer and how it picks up an indexes new photos as they are introduced from a CD or memory stick. Picasa does not move photos, it simply indexes them and makes them easier to find.

Picasa also has some editing and slide show features that are easy to use. Interested? Go to Google and type in Picasa.

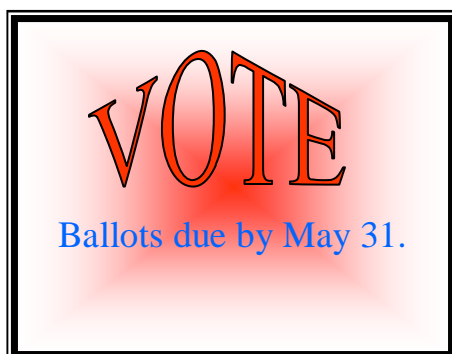

A GOOD QUESTION...



Actually, two good questions.

Why does the club mail out the election ballot if there is only one candidate for each office of the Board of Directors? Why can't we just vote with a show of hands at the April General Meeting?

A GOOD ANSWER...

The By-Laws of our club follow the guidelines established for clubs by the Association and require that 25% of the membership must be present at a meeting held for the election of officers. We have 1067 members, which means that 266 must be attending the meeting in order to get the 25%. With many of our members leaving in April for their winter homes or travel, it is highly unlikely that we could ever meet the requirement.

With a ballot, sent by U. S Postal service, all members have the opportunity to vote. It is up to them whether they return the ballot or not.

The club also takes the opportunity to mail a membership renewal form with each ballot as a convenience and a reminder to members that membership is renewable on July 1. Ballots are due on May 31. You may mail your response or put the it in the box in the lab.

Many members return their membership renewal in May. Treasurer Jack Drill, assures you that your check will be banked shortly after it is received.

Sorting Email by Thread

Most email programs sort messages in reverse order by date received, so the newest messages are at the top. Starting in 10.3, the Mail program can also sort by thread, which means grouping messages that are part of the same discussion. To give it a try, choose "Organize by thread" from the "View" menu.

Running out of Screen Space

Find yourself running out of screen space? Even with Expose, this is still a problem for some users. Fortunately there is a fantastic and free solution: Desktop Manager. It allows you to use 'virtual' desktops, which is almost like having additional monitors connected (except of course you can only see and use one desktop at a time). Desktop Manager is stable and free; find more info at Macupdate or Versiontracker. Editor's pick!

Don't Fixate On Megapixels

Tip of the Day from Smart Computing

In general, yes, a 6-megapixel camera produces better quality than a 4-megapixel camera. However, you shouldn't select a camera based on a pixels-per-dollar equation. 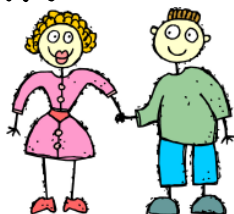

PC Users, join us; you too use PrintShop and Word. We may do things a bit differently, but you'll pick up the ideas and then run with them.

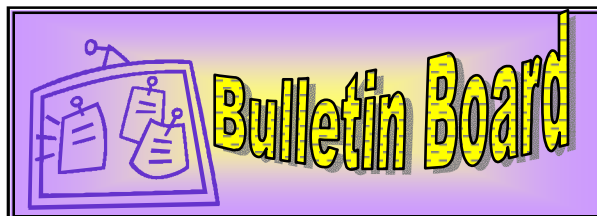
