At our February 22nd meeting, Lyn Morse acted as Facilitator in the absence of Moderator Ron Delgado, who was celebrating his mother's 85th birthday with her. Lyn remarked on the efficacy of alternating the Friday morning monthly meetings with the 7:00 p.m. Tuesday evening meetings, which has succeeded in attracting different segments of the Macintosh population.

Something new was tried this month, a giveaway of items and programs no longer in use by their owners. The giveaways were at the rear of the lab for those who wanted them at the conclusion of the meeting. Perhaps one day this could be done for all of Let's Compute.

Lyn demonstrated the CD Stomper, a neat device for putting personal labels on CD's; Lyn reported she found the program (Stomper and program only) on sale at Target for \$8.90; it is also at Costco for around \$25 and includes CDs and jewel boxes. It is both Mac and PC compatible. If you're headed for Fry's, you can sometime find them for \$5. This is a must for everyone burning CDs. A class in CD Burning is on the March schedule.

Another very useful item, the Note Pad, was also demonstrated as a very useful tool for keeping track of various pieces of information one may want for future use; it is on all Macs. This device is essentially a copy-and-paste item, easy to duplicate and set up in a folder. Terry Kaye's Email List, SCPD-Subscribe@Yahoogroup.com was recommended as a tremendous resource for all kinds of information useful for club members. The Note Pad is a good way to copy information quickly from Terry's email list.

When several members reported they were not sure at all if the CD Burner program was indeed on their newer iMACs, Neal Denkler spoke to the Apple System Profiler (under the Apple), which will display just what is included on your Mac; the CD-RW feature under Devices and Volumes would indicate if the CD Burner program is available. He resoundingly

endorsed the MacLinkPlus program, which enables Mac and PC email and attachments to interact seamlessly.

It was recommended that members searching for new larger items and upgrades to purchase should be sure to check out the catalogs: MAC Connections, 1-800-800-2222; MacZone, 1-800-248-0800; and MacWarehouse, 1-800-622-6222 are all sales tax free. MacMall, a California-based company, 1-800-222-2808, does charge a sales tax.

It was also recommended that the Apple stores in Costa Mesa, Glendale and at Fashion Mall in San Diego be visited. The meeting concluded with a questions and answers session. A call is out for new teaching volunteers for both Mac and PC classes. 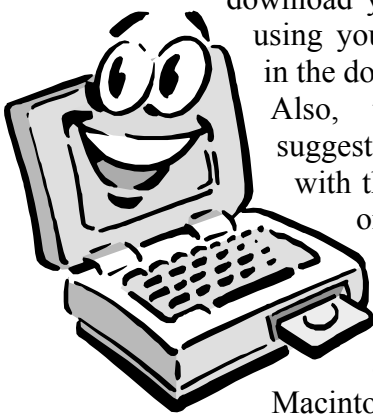
Digital Photos From Camera to Computer

Okay, you have that brand new digital camera and you're taking pictures like crazy. After all, you can throw photos away if you don't like them, and you don't feel guilty because they haven't been printed out.

However, you're also going through batteries like crazy! Learn how a memory card reader can download your photos fast by not using your camera and batteries in the downloading process.



Also, there will be some suggestions about what to do with the photos once they are on your computer.

Windows software provides no defense against Trojan Horse programs, and passwords, especially simple ones, are easy to crack. Most computer owners don't know how to protect their internet connection. Unaware of the risks of an unprotected connection, many owners simply choose to ignore the problem altogether and don't buy antivirus or firewall software. Furthermore, many of us don't make sure that all the security patches get applied, so hackers can exploit publicly known security holes. Windows XP users need to download a patch that closes such a hole. You might think Microsoft would know better than to create a security hole again in their new software, but you would be wrong.

Antivirus programs scan files (and sometimes, emails) to see if they contain the "signature" of a known virus or other program. But virus checkers do not provide any means to prevent a computer from being hacked.

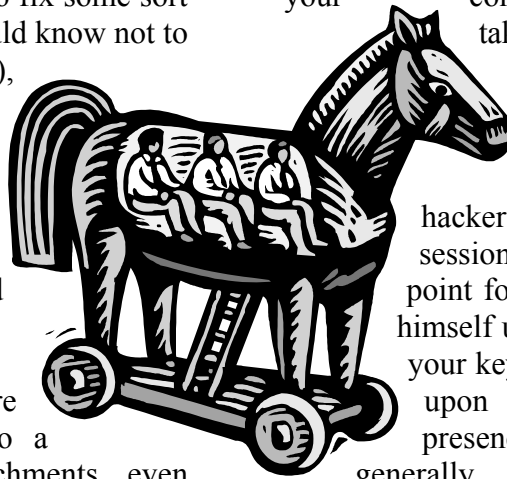


Only firewall software can do that.

The Internet is fertile ground for hackers trying to learn your passwords. Many users have the same password for every online account, whether it be Yahoo, Travelocity or any other. So once the hacker has one password, he will be able to get into multiple accounts. One way in which hackers have been known to obtain your password is through an on-line form. They send out some sort of sweepstakes information and ask the user to put in a name (including e-mail address. NEVER fill out unsolicited forms, especially one that asks for credit card information or passwords. These forms can be sent by e-mail or through US Mail. US Mail provides a better appearance and may fool you into thinking that the sweepstakes might be a legitimate enterprise.

Another way hackers may obtain information online is by pretending to be your service provider sending e-mail through the network and asking to verify your account information. This type of attack shouldn't work, because users should be more cautious of hackers when online, and they should remember that their internet service provider will NEVER ask them to supply their account information or password online. However, requests often get results because users can be too trusting. In addition, official looking pop-up windows can be sent by hackers requesting the user reenter his username and password to fix some sort of problem. By now, most users should know not to send passwords in clear text (if at all), but it never hurts to have an occasional reminder of this simple security measure. You should never disclose their passwords in any fashion other than a face-to-face conversation with a trusted friend or technician.

E-mail can also be used for more direct means of gaining access to a system. For instance, e-mail attachments, even those sent from someone you know and trust, can carry viruses, worms or Trojan horses. Even your internet service provider can be fooled. A hacker once called AOL's tech support and spoke with the support person for an hour. During the conversation, the hacker mentioned that his car was for sale cheaply. The tech supporter was interested, so the hacker sent an e-mail attachment 'with a picture of the car'. Instead of a car photo, the mail executed a Trojan Horse that opened a connection in AOL's firewall.



A Trojan Horse, one of a hacker's simplest tools, is a malicious, security-breaking program that is disguised as something benign, like a game, Christmas card, or in one notorious 1990 case on the Mac, was disguised as a program to find and destroy viruses. My son once downloaded a program that promised to keep him from being disconnected from AOL, but instead erased all the files on his hard drive. When users install the dummy program by downloading and double clicking on it, the Trojan Horse destroys files, or worse, like the original Trojan Horse, sneaks into your computer and allows attackers to

take over your computer. Two examples are BackOrifice and Netbus, which are programs that allow hackers to control your computer remotely. The hacker can see passwords, run a DOS session, use your computer as a relay point for communications (so as to make himself untraceable), read your mail, track your keystrokes and lots more. It depends upon the owners unawareness of its presence, and to get installed, it generally requires a lack of caution, misplaced trust or simply an unawareness of risks on the part of its victims. Unfortunately, those very traits are typical of a large proportion of Internet users. Once in your system, a remote hacker can perform practically any function on your computer, most of them without any outward indication to you. Where BackOrifice or Netbus is concerned, what you don't know most certainly **can** hurt you.

Minutes of Board of Directors Meeting February 19, 2002

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors was held on February 19, 2002, at 3:00 p.m. in the computer lab. President, Sheldon Plotkin presided. Board members present were: Jim Calvert, Neal Denkler, Bob Jameson, Kent McDonald, Leonette Rowe and Jan Grenert. Also present was member Lyn Morse.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and a correction made as follows: In paragraph 9, second bulleted item, the term “flat bed scanners” should read “photo slide scanners”.

Treasurer Leonette Rowe reported a cash balance of \$11, 959.85, which includes a check for \$1685.60 received from Dell from an overcharge on the purchase of the new computers. She also noted that it is time for the quarterly audit.

All software purchases approved at the last Board meeting have been completed and the software installed. Other items purchased include 3 printers and 2 flat bed scanners with photo slide attachments.

Jim Calvert said 70 hours of classes were scheduled for this month and he expects to schedule 80 hours next month. A teacher meeting will be held on Thursday, March 7 at 2:00 p.m. It was noted that many members come in to the lab and disrupt class that is in session. A sign will be posted as to open lab hours, i.e. 10 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Teachers can then choose to lock the lab door when class is in session.

Kent McDonald sends the schedule of classes to all members who have e-mail. They need only the free program Acrobat Reader to view the file. Kent said he is still developing and refining the club’s web site.

Neal Denkler has Microsoft scheduled to present a program at the General Meeting, which will take place at 3:00 p.m. on 2/26/02 in the Speakers’ Hall. He is still working on a program for the March meeting.

Bob Jameson presented the Board with a new bid from Roadrunner for installation of service for 1 router, 8 ports and 1 modem to connect 7 computers and one printer to the high-speed service. Approved by the Board, the installation should take place on or about 2/23/02.

Two of the old computers have been donated to the Genealogy Club. Three remain in the lab. The disposal of the balance is under consideration.

Jim Calvert made a request that the club purchase a USB “reader” for use with digital camera memory cards and compact flash cards. Lyn Morse said the club has received a free SanDisk reader from the manufacturer.

The Board has received CCOC approval of our revised By-laws. Copies of the By-laws will be posted in the lab and in the library. The membership will be asked to approve them at the March General Meeting.

Formation of a Nominating Committee was discussed, as was the balloting process. The Board is to appoint the nominating committee to prepare a ballot for the May election. The Board favored mailing ballots to all members as well as a dues reminder.

Prorating of dues was discussed but failed to find support among the Board members.

Jim Calvert suggested that the club send a “Welcome” letter to all new members after they join. He proposed the letter contain information about the club. Lyn Morse offered to compose the letter from guidelines provided by the Board.

A discussion on holding some type of recognition party/gathering for Teachers, Monitors, Helpers and others who make this club operated. The Board approved the idea and will pursue it.

A suggestion was made by Lyn Morse that the club subscribe to a couple of computer magazines instead of relying on old issues donated to the club.

The meeting adjourned at 5:05 p.m.
